CHAPLAIN'S CORNER Jon Bartlow, Chaplain

Do you have some 'current event' or 'political' concern that really irritates you, and for which you think the answers are obvious? Of course you do, and you are not alone. One that really bugs me is 'climate change.' As a former science teacher I have spent a lot of time studying the subject and often find myself irritated that those who cry loudest seem to promote nothing that would really make a difference. The combination of this and the irrational propaganda such as pictures of the earth on fire (literally) make it hard for me not to scoff openly at the hypocrisy. If that weren't enough, my nearly 62 completed years have witnessed no meaningful change in weather patterns as winter turns to spring and the kids start playing baseball, softball, and running track; unless a brief fear of global cooling in the mid 1970s is figured in. Many disagree with me strongly and that's okay. You may have pressing concerns in another area and wonder how it is possible to make a difference as a Christian. Maybe it is secure borders, the prevalence of prescription drug abuse, growing atheistic globalism, rampant social inequity, pervasive anxiety in youth, or even the current scare we are all hearing about with the failing banking system in the news recently. Whatever it is that draws your ire, there is no end to the fear we could take hold of and run screaming for someone to fix things and protect us from be it in nature, human tribalism, or just the abundance of existential uncertainty we feel.

None of our concerns are a surprise to God, and even the worst of them He already has in hand. With climate change, the silly earth on fire pictures parallel with God's ultimate judgment when he says he will destroy the earth by fire (2 Peter 3:7). But this should not scare the faithful follower of Christ because the Bible also says that for as long as creation lasts "seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter... shall not cease." (Genesis 8:22). That's a promise we can count on amidst the fears the world brings.

The same can be said of the almost ubiquitous pedaling of uncertainty and fear in our day. We have examples in the Bible with men who opposed prevailing culture, listened to the voice of God, and made a clarion call for a better way. Joseph preserved the security of God's people as well as pagan Egypt when he interpreted Pharaoh's dream and presented a plan to overcome widespread famine in the ancient world. Daniel persevered when he stood against the pagan politicians of his day who sought his life and reputation by persuading the king that all who worshiped anyone but him should be devoured by lions. And Nehemiah petitioned the king on behalf of God's people to rebuild and restore that which was in disrepair. (Read More Here)
